Galapagos tortoises (Guh-lop-uh-ghos Tor-tus-es) live in South America on the Galápagos Islands. They are giant tortoises. They live only on land and can weigh hundreds of pounds. There is a different kind of tortoise on each of the big Galápagos Islands. Let's learn more!

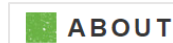

FUN FACTS
Las Islas de los Galápagos, or the Islands of the Tortoises, are named for the famed giant tortoises found nowhere else in the world.
A Galápagos tortoise can go without eating or drinking for up to a year because it can store food and water in its body.
Galápagos tortoise Speed arrived at the San Diego Zoo in 1933 as an adult. He lived to be an estimated 150 years old.

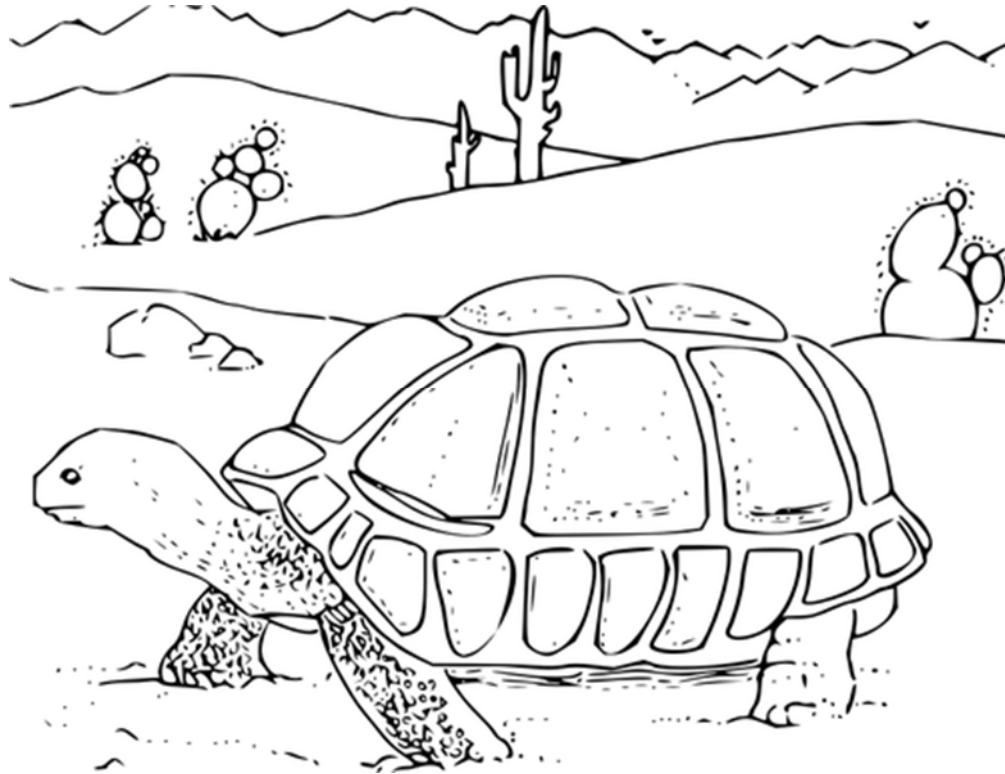

Glossary

Galapagos Islands (Guh-lop-uh-ghos Eye-linds) - Volcanic islands in the Pacific Ocean near South America. There are many famous animals there.

Herbivore (Her-bih-vor) – An animal that eats only plants.

Threatened (Thre-tin-d) – When an animal is scared or about to get hurt.

Tortoise (Tor-tus) – A type of turtle that lives on land.

Whaling Ships (Whale-ing Ships) – Ships that were created to hunt, kill, and capture whales.
