

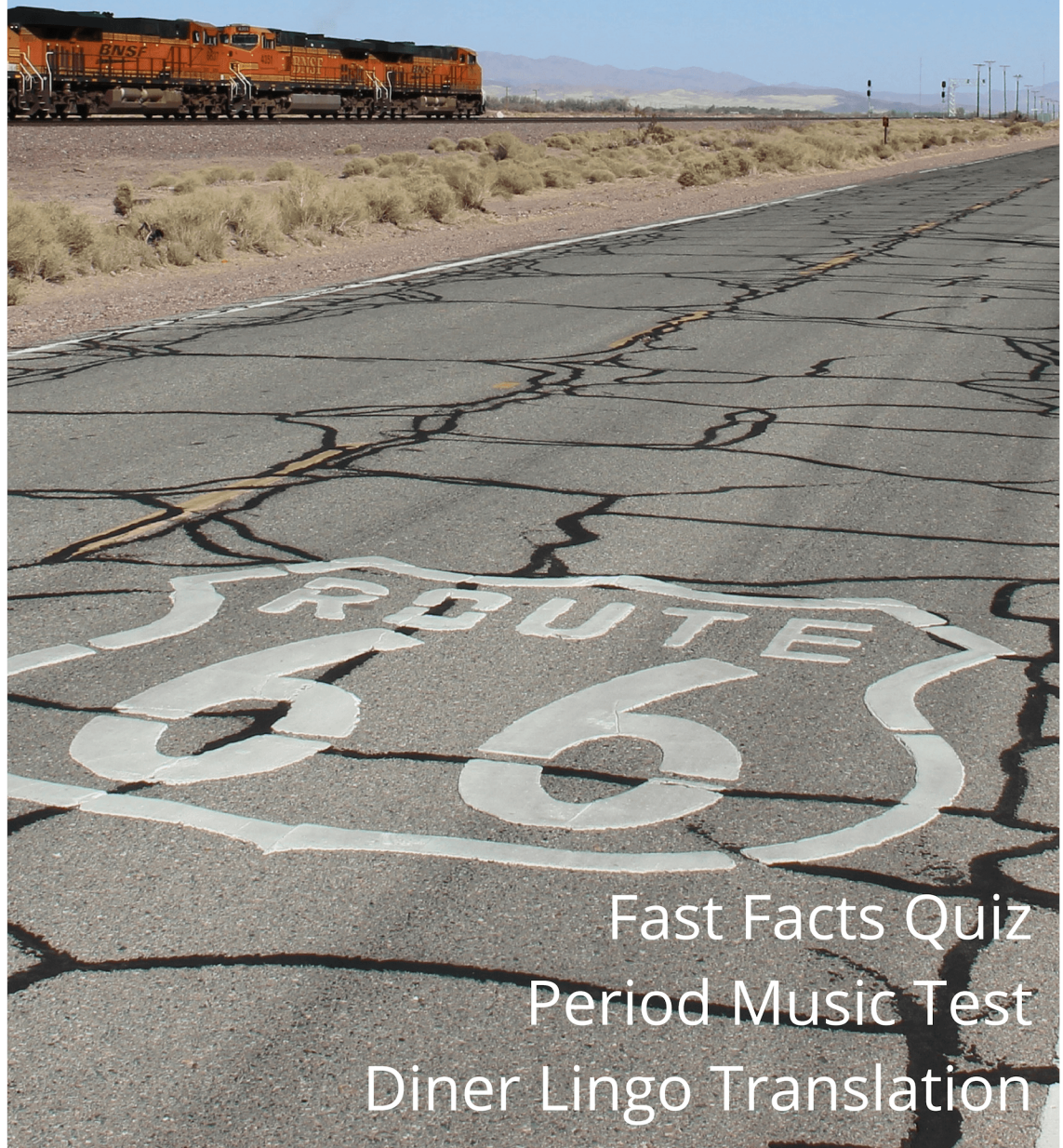

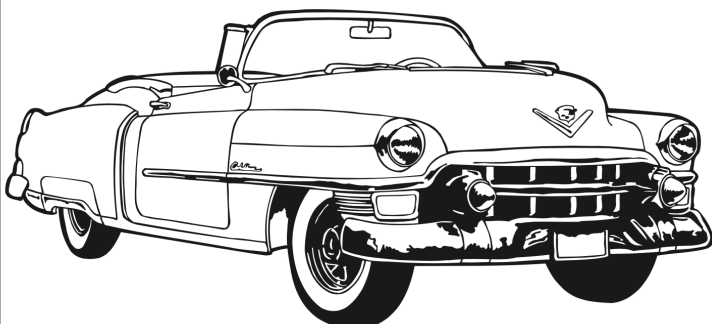

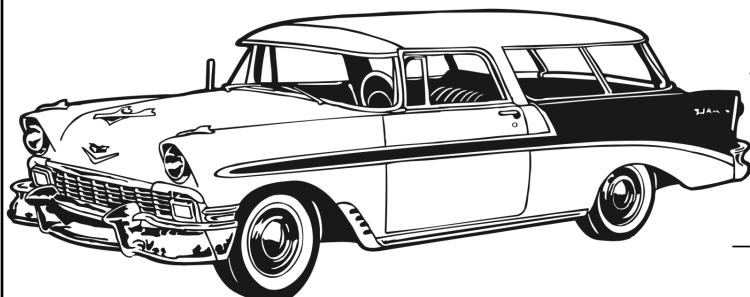

Route 66 Trivia Answers



1. Answer: C., U.S. 60. When commissioners devised a nomenclature for the new U.S. interstate highway system in 1926, east-to-west highways were given even numbers, with the most important routes being assigned numbers ending in "0." The new Chicago-Los Angeles highway was named Route 60, but a few other states claimed their interstate highway should get that all-important designation, and the number 66 was designated to keep the project from stalling.
2. Answer: C, 10 years. 800 miles were already paved in 1926; efforts to pave the remainder were completed in early 1937.
3. Answer: A, the Lincoln Highway. Dedicated on October 31, 1913, the Lincoln Highway ran 3,389 miles, from New York City to San Francisco.
4. Nicknames include: The Mother Road, America's Main Street / The Main Street of America, Will Rogers Highway, Double Six
5. Answer: 8 states
6. Answer: (from east to west) Illinois, Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, California
7. Answer: C, approximately 2,400 miles. The exact number would vary by year, as highway realignments were made.
8. Answer: Texas. The town of Adrian, Texas (population 159) is approximately 1,139 miles from both Chicago and Los Angeles.
9. Answer: C, approximately 85% of Route 66 is still drivable.
10. Answer: Arizona. An uninterrupted 159-mile stretch of Route 66 runs from Ashfork, AZ to Needles, AZ.

Bonus: The "sidewalk highway," running from Miami, OK to Afton, OK, consists of a single paved lane, with gravel shoulders on either side for passing.

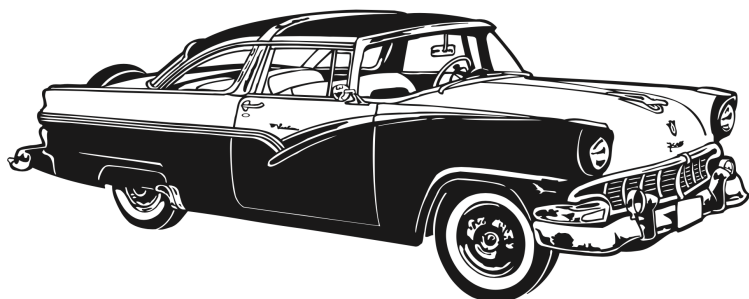
